


JANUARY 2016 SAFETY TIP BY P/C MARCIA ROWLAND, JN

Colliding with an object, boat, fixed dock or sandbar can stop the boat suddenly and throw people about, causing injuries ranging from contusions, abrasions and fractures to concussions and worse. Always know your boat's location and the water

depth.



Watch for hazards, and prepare to avoid them. Use charts, maps, radar or sonar and previous knowledge. If you lack information about an area, slow down or stop, reassess the situation, and if necessary, radio for help. The U.S Guard, Tow Boat US, Sea Tow, Harbormasters and anglers have a wealth of local area information.

NEWS FROM OUR SAILORS

S.V. Libertad currently sits in a slip in Marina Lanzarote, Canary Islands. She's probably quite lonely now as the first wave of 50 Atlantic Odyssey rally boats (http://cornellsailing.com/sail-the-odyssey/atlantic-odyssey/) left on November 18; and most of the 20-boat second wave (of which we are a part) have left Lanzarote and are either exploring the rest of the islands or have arrived

at our departure point of Santa Cruz Marina on the island of Tenerife.

The first boat of the first wave (a catamaran) arrived in Martinique (the rally's landfall) after a fifteen-day passage. We don't hope to match that time, but the good news is the first wave had a rather uneventful journey with plenty of SE trade wind making the passage fast and comfortable -in contrast, last year the first wave had anything but a pleasant passage. So, as January is supposed to be even better than November, weather-wise, we are encouraged by the experience of this first group.

Having crossed the Pacific with just the two of us, Virginia and I decided that we would add another crew member to reduce the stress of a two-person watch schedule. Last October, a crew call went out to friends and family. We were pleased to receive four volunteers, however, now we had the daunting task of having to select only one of them. Dennis as-

assembled a list of 'interview' questions which was meant to somehow rate the volunteers. After four interviews, Dennis was no closer to selecting one of them as the responses made them all welcome additions to the boat.

Fate came to his rescue -somewhat. Shortly after the interviews, two of the volunteers were faced with conflicts during the three weeks and had to decline. The remaining two were very enthusiastic about the opportunity and had no personal or work-related deterrents. After discussing the situation, Virginia and I decided that adding two crew members would be the best solution. So joining us across the Atlantic will be Steve Young, who has crewed on Libertad previously on a Baja Ha Ha and James Hirsch, a relatively new squadron member, who has sailed coastal waters and is seeking blue water experience.

We will be assigned a GPS tracker by the Atlantic Odyssey organization and anyone interested in our progress across the pond, you will be able to follow us online beginning on January 10 at the Atlantic Odyssey website:

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News from the ECCO BELLA Submitted by Lt. Peggy Ciolino, S

Here is an excerpt from the Ciolino Blog (www.sailblogs/member/eccobella) describing our time in San Blas, Mexico. Peggy Ciolino

Saturday, December 12

The general word about San Blas, from what I've gathered, is more negative than positive because of the bugs. And with my hundreds of mosquito bites — maybe a slight exaggeration, but all my itchy bites are pretty annoying and unsightly — I still am very glad we stopped here.



The current excitement is another sailboat docking at this marina.

The boat just ran aground, even though the tide is supposed to be pretty high right now. It somehow maneuvered off the bar that it was stuck on and just made it to the dock. So now, there are three boats from the Ha Ha here along with two other sailboats. I think that most of us are on the same track and will be leaving tomorrow morning for ports south. We are planning on stopping in Chacala, a nice anchorage with a small village, for several nights before going on to La Cruz.

Going back to where I left off last time, the barracuda was delicious!! We barbecued it and it was very light and flaky. The next day after having barracuda, we walked to "La Contaduría," the old counting house and fort. It isn't far, and overlooks the town and bay. From the moment we arrived, the mosquitos were everywhere and after me. "La Contaduría" consists of some beautiful old stone buildings, including an old church. We walked up a long driveway that is being redone, into the main building and began talking to a docent there. He only spoke Spanish! He told us that he had been to Miami and other cities in the U.S. playing his guitar in shows and on TV and then he went over and picked up his guitar, which had been on a stand, and started singing to us. We talked for a long time afterwards and it was wonderful, because he didn't speak any English and I got to practice for at least 20 minutes!! I really think he probably could speak English, but chose not to, I think, out of a sense of pride. Many people that I talk to here are very proud of the history of San Blas as a major Spanish port in the 18th century, where Father Serra stopped as he worked his way up into Alta California. They also are proud of their language and are appreciative of those who speak Spanish. The docent finished off our time together with a song about "Ricardo and Margarita" — about a sailor looking for his love — at least I think that is what it was about!!

We finally left, and walked back down the hill and onto the street that we had come on. It was lunchtime, and on this street there are palapa after palapa where they are selling dorado, longista (small lobster), and various other grilled fish. Richard picked one he thought looked good and we had a longista lunch — very good!! We continued on our way until we got to a woman selling oysters. We had tried some on our way to "La Contaduría," and wanted to get some more. We bought a half-dozen, but she didn't have change. This seems to be a constant problem here. Many of the merchants where we've bought things, have had to go next door or down the block for change for a bill as small as 100 pesos (about \$6). The woman was going to send her daughter up the street to buy something to get some change, so I volunteered to do that instead and we were able to pay for our oysters. Unfortunately, we thought we could open them when we got to the boat, but these oysters have a different kind of shell than those that we get at home and they were nearly impossible to open and we only had 3 out of the 6. They were delicious though.

Yesterday, we went shopping for provisions for our trip to Chacala and then on to La Cruz. The grocery store is pretty big, but not too good. It has no produce, meats or fish. I wanted to buy some shrimp and I found someone on the street selling them, that were on ice and had no flies on them, so we bought some. I found a produce market and found many vegetables. The owner spoke with us for awhile and told us that he sells everything. He has other stores where he sells appliances at very cheap prices to people who can't afford much. He also said he sells real estate. I imagine he's not unlike many families here, who scrounge a living from as many sources as possible. While we were standing there, several people bought things and he wrote down what they bought and the cost on a pad of paper — running a tab!! From him, we found where to go to get some meat. At this tienda, the butcher was at the rear. When I asked for ground meat, he brought out a side of a cow, put it on the slicer, and sliced a piece of meat, which he said

was top sirloin. Then he put it through his grinder for me.

Last night we went to dinner at the San Blas Social Club, or what I call Rick's Place, because it reminds us of the movie Casablanca - and the owner is from Brooklyn and actually resembles Humphrey Bogart. An American meal of a pork chop with apples, mashed potatoes and spinach tasted good for a change. Richard had a nice plate of

glers have a chance to load up on quality reds (vermillion), copper rockfish (chucklehead) and other rockfish as well as big burly lingcod throughout SoCal. Head out armed with double dropper loop rigs, weights from 5 ounces to one pound and a variety of live and frozen baits including squid, anchovies, shrimp and the surprise bait... chicken skin (fish love it).

The best bet for great fishing is the Channel Islands. Santa Rosa and San Miguel islands are home to Jurassic fish which don't get fished regularly due to distance and prevailing winds. During December we enjoy some long periods of Santana winds from the east, which calm the waters and make it possible to target the biggest rockfish most anglers have ever seen. Plan a trip out of Santa Barbara Harbor, Ventura Harbor or Channel islands Harbor to make a long run to the west end of the Channel Islands chain.

As the new year begins, we have limited options for keeping fish. Permissible targets include calico bass, sand bass, spotted bay bass, white seabass, yellowtail, halibut, sole, sand dabs and all members of the tuna family (bonito and mackerel are sometimes caught locally during the winter months).

Local anglers sometimes have good success with calico bass during the early winter season. Water temps have not yet plummeted (especially in the El Nino year) and the fish still feed actively. December calico action was good overall and the good fortune should continue into early Janu-

arv. Just remember the golden rule of wintertime calico fishing; "fish low and slow". The bass are a bit more lethargic than they are during the warmer part of the year and it is necessary to tickle their noses with baits a little lower in the water column and a little longer before they decide to strike
