






One of the treasures was a life saving device for a person overboard. This was ably demonstrated by Steve Young as he "rescued" Art Aldritt from the deep green lawn area.

## A Whale Tail (the picture that got away)


Friday morning September 24th crossing to Pelican's will be remembered for humpback whale sightings about six miles from Santa Cruz Island. After a foggy motor sail, some blue sky was peaking through, while the autopilot allowed captain Scott Burns and our first-time to the Channel Islands guest, Matina, to doze. Lisa, keeping watch from the captain's chair, spotted a whale off the bow about 200 yards. Quickly calling attention, all eyes were searching the horizon for it. Scott said, "Let me get my camera." We were looking around, wondering where the whale would emerge again. Just about that time we heard a 'flushing' noise and the sailboat rocked, then the giant whale shot up at about 100 feet off the Benchmark's beam. The size was magnificent and astonishing as it slightly turned in the air to show its light grey underbelly, then a giant splash! Scott didn't get the photo, but we agreed that it reminded us of the insurance commercial logo. It seemed very big and was very close to our boat.



We anchored at Pelican's Harbor, timed nicely with Ecco Bella's arrival. There were eight boats by that evening. Lisa & Matina kayaked to Lisa's favorite spot of "Hole in the Wall," where the high tide created a blow hole spraying out water like a blast furnace.

The next morning Peggy, Scott, Lisa & Matina hiked from Pelican's to Prisoner's Harbor where we saw some of the old ranch buildings. A shared ride for Lisa with owners of cruiser Whale Rider from PCYC & Ventura Power Squadron, allowed another 1 ½ hour hike back for the other three. Saturday

night, Ecco Bella hosted an epic 12 game Mexican Train. Even with the weekend's low clouds, it was a calm and relaxing trip with dolphins escorting us most of the way home.




#### Pelican Bay Cruise, Part 2

Here are some additional photos and comments about the cruise to Pelican Bay over the weekend of September 25<sup>th</sup>, 2021.

We begin with a photo of our leaving Santa Barbara Harbor at about 08:30 on Friday morning in a heavily overcast sky and flat calm wind conditions. That's *S/V Benchmark* up ahead with Stearns Wharf to the left. This weather condition stayed with us for the entire trip to Pelican and for most of the weekend resulting in most of our pictures not being very bright and colorful.



Earlier this summer we twice traveled to Catalina Island and came across large pods of dolphins but not one whale sighting. In fact, whale sightings for us have been zero for several years in the Santa Barbara Channel – call it bad luck I guess as I'm sure they were out there. Well, our luck changed this time! We saw a few large pods of dolphins, I mean hundreds at a time, and three or more whales. As is their nature some dolphins came in and played near our boat – here are a few pictures as they swam in the calm waters.







As for whale sightings, most were off in the distance and the one that was very close to us came as a surprise and we missed the chance to photograph

it. Here then are the best we could muster from our photos and videos of the whale sightings.






We can't recall when there were so few boats anchored in Pelican Bay. Upon our arrival on Friday at about noon there were four boats and we made it six until two more boats joined us – that was it. By the time we left on Sunday morning only two boats remained. This gave us all plenty of room and most of us used the traditional bow and stern anchoring technique, I think mostly because of the expectation that more boats would show up on Saturday.

This picture shows us approaching Pelican Bay with a fog covering the hilltops. *S/V Benchmark* is already in the bay scoping out an anchoring site so five boats are seen.



The *S/V Benchmark* crew and Peggy took a hike over to Prisoners Cove on Saturday morning. It's about a four mile round trip trek with several short but noticeable climbs and dips along the way.

The view as the hikers return to Pelican Bay. What's left is a climb down to the beach at Tinkers Harbor where the dinghy had been pulled ashore, and the ride back to the boats just around the corner.

After the hike the crews did some kayaking and dinghy exploring before getting together for a relaxing evening. The *S/V Benchmark* crew joined us on *S/V Ecco Bella* for a 17:00 cocktail and snack time. We started out in the cockpit but it wasn't too long before the sun dipped behind the west wall of the bay dropping the temperature several degrees and sending us down below to continue. The plan was to have dinner aboard *S/V Ecco Bella* after cocktail hour so we slid right into that. Lisa had prepared a chili dinner for her crew, so she brought the pot over and warmed it up on our stove. Meanwhile I barbecued hamburgers for us. I also barbecued zucchini and Peggy had made a potato salad, and we shared both with the *Benchmark* crew, they shared Lisa's chicken and beanless chilli, which was delicious.

After dinner we started a game of Mexican Train Dominoes that lasted until midnight! It was loads of fun and we made it all the way from "double 12's" to "double 1's" (This means something to those that have played before, and for those that have not, it's a very long game to play to completion.) before calling it quits as eyes were closing and mouths were yawning. Here's a picture as the game ended. The winner? First-time player and guest Matina on the right!



S/V Benchmark was first to get underway to Santa Barbara at about 08:30 the following morning. Here's a picture of them heading home under, yes, overcast sky and no wind to sail by. We had no pressing time to be home so didn't get underway until 13:00.



The following is perhaps a bit of an aside but it is actually connected to this story. Several months ago I was gifted a drone that's capable of taking photos and videos from aloft. It's very small, about the size of a cell phone with little arms sticking out where the motors/propellors are. It's quite a good little drone and has amazing flight characteristics and takes very good images. I've played with it on shore but have been reluctant to fly it from our boat although I would love to get some images while sailing. My main

fear is losing control of it at sea. In particular is the retrieval process that requires either landing it on a flat surface, preferably one that is not moving about very much, and catching it by hand. I'm ok with the catching method on solid ground where the only thing moving is the drone but not so confident hand catching it on a bobbing and bouncing boat. So, this Sunday morning seemed like a good time to try flying it from our boat. I determined that I have a pretty perfect launch and landing pad in the form of a solar panel, and was willing to try it. The sea state at this time was ideal in that it was quite flat and what wind there was was less than five knots. Launch went well and I flew for about 11 minutes before landing back at the solar panel next to me as seen in the following pictures.



After the successful drone flight Peggy suggested we take a dinghy ride out of Pelican around the west corner and go up the coast a bit to see the "arch"

that Lisa told us about earlier this weekend. We had vague recollections about this from past visits to Pelican but really couldn't remember much about it. Well, we were very pleasantly surprised because it is beautiful! In fact for a half mile or so up the coast from Pelican there are some beautiful sights to see. Here's a picture of the arch from the front.

While the seas were small there was still enough wave action in the arch to keep us from trying to enter it. Going further west (beyond the hole seen to



the right) of the arch it becomes evident that there is an inlet that goes around the back of the hillside to merge with the entrance to the arch. On a really calm and flat sea state day one might be able to dinghy or kayak around and through the arch.


Just to the left of the arch a blowhole was belching water after swallowing a swell.



The arch is actually part of a tiny peninsula sticking out from the main island and the other, or back, side of it forms an inlet as seen in this next picture. The back side of the arch is to the far left.



There are some caves and interesting rocks a bit further west from the arch. The swell's interaction with the caves and rocks creates some beautiful images such as the following picture that tries to capture the backflow of a swell falling off the rocks.



The arch and other interesting sights are less than a mile from our anchorage in Pelican Bay so it is quite assessable. We returned to our boat to begin preparing to leave for Santa Barbara.

With the weather conditions we motored all the way home but it was nice despite the lack of any wind to sail by as we saw some more dolphin pods and a couple of whales.
