

**Cruising Under Power and Sail**, our current educational offering, will finish its five-week run on Tuesday April 2. This last session for the class of eight attendees will focus on going through the process of planning a cruise – we have a mix of sail and power boaters in the class so it should be fun.

As for what's to follow, the educational committee is discussing what classes to offer next. One course we'll be planning is an abbreviated Engine Maintenance course focusing on diesel engines. The plan is to borrow the working diesel engine display from Ventura Sail and Power squadron to use as a teaching aid. The lectures will be given in our normal 7PM Tuesday

night classroom sessions and we'd use the diesel engine display for a final Saturday outdoor session. Perhaps we can tie in with the Santa Barbara Yacht Club and use their parking lot for the display.

We'll be doing a series of Summer Seminars again including the "Celestial Navigation Primer with a focus on the Noon Day Sun Sight" which has been very popular with local boaters. Other seminars under consideration are Using Navigation Charts and GPS Chartplotters, Introduction to Navigation, Rules of the Road, Anchoring, Partner in Command, and Weather for Boaters.

We would like to get another technical course in this year like Electrical Systems.

### **Polyestermite Alert!**

Nothing has been written in the boating press at this point about Polyestermites. However, this spring their infestation was noted as far north as Rhode Island. Scientists had thought that Polyestermites could not survive in the colder northern waters, but the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection has now issued an alert for New Jersey boaters. An obscure article in the Federal Register has not received much attention by the press, but you can be certain that the pages of our boating magazines will soon carry large, bold headlines about this new problem for boaters.

So what the heck are Polyestermites, and what is the problem. They are small barnacle size snail-like creatures that attach themselves to bottoms of boats, pilings and bulkheads. They seem to have an affinity for boats, however, because most are now made of fiberglass.

Other than their slimy appearance, they do no damage to pilings and bulkheads. Fiberglass boats, however, are another matter. Polyestermites are not deterred by anti-fouling paints, and, in fact, they seem to thrive on it. They eat their way through bottom paint, and then have gelcoat for desert. They seem to secrete a substance that dissolves gelcoat into a paste that is then consumed. What is left are areas about the size of a dime where the gelcoat is completely gone leaving the fiberglass and resin exposed to salt water. Interestingly, Polyestermites cannot survive in fresh water, but most of us operate our boats in salt water.

The Federal EPA has prepared a twenty-page booklet fully explaining Polyestermites, and the procedure for their detection and repair of their damage. It also discusses preventive measures we can take to prevent their damage.

OK, that's enough of that. Happy April Fools Day! What you have just read is a recent attempt by a John Baker, JN, on Boat Banter, Captain Crunch, to recreate an article that ran in Sail magazine sometime in the 70's in an April issue. I read the original April article back then and was hooked for a while until I came to my senses.
