



## **Chasing Two Bodies of Celestial Navigation**

We needed to make this article relevant to boating, so that title is the best we could come up with.

Virginia and I realized that the total solar eclipse to happen on Monday, April 8 passing across the continental US may be our best opportunity to experience this unique event. The path was to pass over Dallas, TX and we had friends and relatives along that path, so it made sense that we could enjoy visiting those folks while waiting for the eclipse. Of course travelling 2000+ miles to experience 4 minutes of an event may seem a bit of a folly but we are here to tell you it was worth it!

Fortunately our land yacht, a 25' class C RV travels somewhat faster than Libertad, so we didn't need to plan for 3 weeks of transit like we did crossing the Pacific Ocean to the Marquesas. Nevertheless, just like plans must remain flexible in cruising, our plans changed on this trip as well. Our initial plan was to leave on Monday, March 25 with a short jaunt to Riverside, CA to visit Virginia's sister thereby making the haul to Tucson, AZ much easier, having left LA county behind and reduced the transit time to Tucson by several hours. We got a call from her sister the day before advising that she had contracted COVID! OK, no stop in Riverside, now nonstop to Tucson which turned out to be about 9 hours -yes we know people who can do it in much less but we keep the cruise control at 60mph to save fuel. And it was worth it. We filled up the diesel tank at \$5.35 a gallon in Santa Barbara. Our next fill up was in Tonopah, AZ for \$3.73 a gallon. We only have a 26 gallon tank on the RV so at 60mph we can get about 15.5 miles per gallon =403 miles. This is all Dead Reckoning math which we learned in SBSPS Piloting! Libertad has a motoring range of over 750 miles but then fueling stations can be quite a bit further apart.

We visited a friend in Tucson who had helped us by driving our son Darren to his swimming lessons when he was about 12. She was aghast to hear that he is celebrating his 50<sup>th</sup> birthday this year.

Our next stop was Texas where we would be visiting a couple we had met cruising, Bill & Judy Rouse. They also owned an Amel sailboat and we had

been following their exploits as they travelled the world starting about a year ahead of us. We finally caught up with them in Croatia and did some buddy boating from there to the Caribbean where they swallowed their anchor and settled in Galveston. Bill & Judy gave us a grand tour of Galveston leaving just five days before the eclipse.

While cruising, we'd check the weather several days out before leaving the anchorage or marina, watching for the best weather window. We learned that forecasts were of little value beyond three or four days. Knowing that, we started checking the forecasts for Dallas, TX (where our next stop for visiting family & friends was to be) before leaving Galveston. The forecast for the Dallas area did not look good, i.e. overcast and thundershowers for April 7-9. That forecast got us searching for a plan B. Accessing windy.com forecasting, we could filter for cloud cover. We saw that the skies were forecast to be clear in the northern section of Arkansas. Our original plan was to store the RV in Little Rock and fly home from there, so going a little further north of Little Rock was not unreasonable.

Having visited family & friends in the Dallas area under overcast skies, we headed off for Jonesboro, AR. Sight unseen and no reviews yet (no photos on the website), we had made reservations at a very new RV park (they had not finished hooking up electricity to all their sites and their pads had just been asphalted). We actually didn't have much choice as most RV parks along the eclipse path were sold out. As we pulled off the freeway, we looked to the right and realized that the RV park was situated not more than 100 yards from the freeway. In addition, on the other side of the RV park, another 100 yards away, were train tracks. We arrived on Sunday, the day ahead of the eclipse and experienced constant freeway noise during the day and regular freight trains passing all night. To top it off, Sunday was overcast and raining, causing considerable doubt as to whether we'd be on the road again in the morning.

We awoke to clear skies and much anticipation in the folks in the park. As we set up our camping chairs to view the eclipse, our neighboring RVer's from Memphis, TN came over to join us. We had great conversations leading up to the event, similar to what we experienced when meeting fellow cruisers as we sailed around the world –similar interests, shared experiences, recommendations for other adventures.

At about 12:30 the event began. We of course had our eclipse shades to see the start. The entire event would take about 90 minutes so we had plenty of time for discussion between short views of the sun. Virginia had purchased a special filter for her phone camera. With the filter in place and the camera

on maximum zoom, it was difficult to keep the sun in focus. Nevertheless, we got some really good shots included in this article. Here are the most notable experiences during the event:



1) At about ¾ into the eclipse, we could see a change in the sunlight as it began to get darker and continued to darken from then on.



- 2) A little bit later, we could detect a drop in the air temperature which had been in the mid-seventies.
- 3) The northern part of Arkansas is agricultural (wheat fields), so we could see the horizon all around us. As totality neared, we could actually see the shadow of the moon approach us from the southwest. It was not subtle as automatic lights that would come on at dusk were flickering on. Normally dusk takes about 30-45 minutes, this was happening in a fraction of that time.
- 4) At totality, we were not only in an eerie darkness, but we could see the planet Venus in the sky in the middle of the day. Normally at dusk only the western horizon has an orange or pink hue. In this case, the horizon in 360 degrees was that color. Birds & insects stopped chirping, flowers closed, and the freeway noise halted resulting in an unnatural silence –apparently everyone on the freeway had pulled off to view the eclipse even though there were constant electronic signs on the shoulder advising all drivers not to pull off to view the eclipse.



5) Totality lasted only four minutes which didn't give us much time to get a clear photo but we finally got it in focus and got what is called a "diamond ring" shot which includes the corona and the first escaping ray of the sun.

Minutes later everything returned to normal except us. We had experienced several "once in a lifetime" events in our trip around the world and we were overjoyed to add one more. We moved the RV to storage in Little Rock and flew home (like we used to leave *Libertad* on the hard). It will be there for us to continue our journey which will take us to Ohio in June.

# In Memoriam P/C Nils G. A. Lindman, SN June 2, 1939 - March 21, 2024

On March 21, 2024, another long-time member of the Santa Barbara Sail & Power Squadron took his final cruise. Nils Gosta Albin Lindman was an avid boater for most of his life. Nils was a U. S. Naval Radar Technician serving on a Naval Destroyer in his youth. While in the Navy, Nils met his wife, Susan, a U. S. Navy Nurse. He was also a avid Water Skier and continued this sport while their daughters, Julie and Kristi, grew into adulthood. He was also an avid Sailboat Racer. He and his racing partner competed in the Santa Barbara Harbor Wednesday Sail Races aboard their 38' Catalina, *Bobcat*, for many years.

To gain a greater knowledge of *Boating*, Nils joined, what was then, the *Santa Barbara Power Squadron*. He immersed himself in all Educational & Navigation Courses offered and earned *Full Certificate Senior Navigator* status. Nils served on many SBPS offices and committees and was Squadron Commander in 1988.

Nils continued his boating on multiple *Bobcat* cruises and Piloted Yachts in the Pacific Northwest San Juan and Gulf Islands in 2003 and 2006.

One of Nils' favorite boating experiences was looking for calm water to water-ski in. We now wish him "Fare-Winds and Following-Seas" as he cruises off "Looking for Glass!"


